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
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About


Changing Landscapes

Spread over more than 200 square meters of walls, columns, roofs and wood panels inside the six locations of the Poke restaurant in Bogotá, this series of murals created with original art represents the dynamism of the tropical and volcanic landscapes of the Hawaiian islands. Variations in the color palette lend each location its own character. The artwork developed by MUR also served as the basis for a line of packaging and marketing materials produced by the brand.

Varietale Tasting the coffee


2023 60 m2 Bogotá, Colombia

Interior and exterior blend seamlessly in this immersive and contemplative mural for the newest location of Varietale cafes. Integrated with the architectural transformation realized by architect Camilo Delgadillo of this traditional house in the Chapinero neighborhood, the mural represents the tasting experience of Varietale's specialty coffees, interpreting aromas and flavors that are characteristic of their cups through a harmony of abstract shapes and color.













Club Payandé

Oasis

The renovation of the spa at the Payandé club in Villeta was accompanied by a special mural inspired by the lush vegetation of the area. The silhouettes of the plants and the brilliant details evoke an oasis of serenity and relaxation, creating a cozy space where women and girls can share a place to find rest and inspiration.







Casa Primavera

2023 30m2 Villavicencio, Colombia

The main space of this countryside house was accompanied by an abstract mural with an architectural purpose. The painting becomes the focal point of the home's social area, integrating with its surroundings. Precise shapes and vibrant, worn colors interact in a composition that adapts to the geometry and materiality of the house.


















World Trade Center

The large leaves of yarumo are the protagonists of this painting, which, using a wide spectrum of greens, frames and harmonizes the entrance to this room, which also features a facade elaborated in wood.

One Hundred Years of Solitude




The aim of this larger-than-life installation was to pay tribute to the linguistic diversity in which the novel "One Hundred Years of Solitude" has been published, and to highlight its global impact on literature. Drawing inspiration from the original book covers, 19 atypical copies were chosen and painted by hand for display in the vitrine, inviting viewers to reflect on the magnitude and relevance of García Márquez's work. The large books served as a visual metaphor for its importance.












Savvy Low-tech glow

Savvy is an art gallery and ideas laboratory located in Berlin, with a focus on decolonial art and art from the global south. MUR took charge of realizing the gallery's street-facing sign, which needed to be both eye-catching and low-tech as an allusion to the resourcefulness and idiosyncratic techniques often used in the global south. With this objective in mind, Savvy and MUR opted for reflective sequins over energy-consuming bulbs, harnessing natural light to illuminate the gallery's facade and interior.











Unicentro CC

A comprehensive circuit of original illustrations painted on walls, ceilings, stairs, and columns in and around the food court at the Unicentro shopping mall depicts the diversity of stories and life that arise and thrive from Colombia's most extensive and significant body of water, the Magdalena River. Through readings, research, and discussion, the MUR team defined their objective for this mural: to narrate the relationships that emerge between bodies of water and other beings in nature, reminding us of the vital water networks that connect different subjects with their environment.















"With limitations and reduced possibilities, this collection began. During a global juncture in which the supplies we take for granted were depleted, a return to the basics occurred. The balance was found in the present, and the time it took to create was valued. This moment was represented through the repetition of line and stitch, reducing the color palette to black and raw to return to the elemental. Thus, between MUR and Temple, this collaboration was designed, crafted, and painted for those who shared the rhythm and believed in the importance of the slowed-down process. Hence, this collaboration collection was launched in pre-sale with a limited number of units." -Temple











Community-driven projects executing large-scale interventions in the public sphere, considering how communal space can be brought to life through transformative and participatory painting projects. Birds of our park

2023 Bogotá, Colombia 130m2

In collaboration with the local government of Usaquén and the Navarra neighborhood community, the walls and power substation of a local park were transformed to promote environmental awareness and revitalize public space. An interactive mural was created, inspired by urban biodiversity, inviting the community to participate in its ongoing intervention. The designs, suggested by ecologists and verified by the ABO, depict endemic birds and insects of the park and can be interacted with using colored chalk by visitors.


























Mark it down

Everything is connected


2020 Amsterdam 17m2

MARK IT DOWN was a joint initiative between creatives who came together to recover and totally transform an abandoned 3,000 square-meter building in the Sloterdijk area in the city of Amsterdam. The objective was to reactivate this area while creating a beacon of community and belonging for the neighborhood. The 17 square-meter triangular section intervened by MUR was inspired by the notion of connectivity, that radical understanding of the imminent connection of all things and the deep feeling of care that comes with it.









Colegio Sagrado Corazón de Jesús Capurganá

Sale El Sol

2020 150m2 Capurganá, Colombia

MUR collaborated with the Veo Luego Aprendo Foundation in a health and education event at the Sagrado Corazón de Jesús School in Capurganá, Chocó. Invited along with a group of volunteers, they led the intervention at the school with the aim of changing the perception of the space and promoting the return to the facilities after the pandemic. A simple and spacious geometric design was created, allowing community participation in the rehabilitation and restoration of the school. Materials were obtained through donations, and the design, which represented the sun shining over the Sea of Capurganá, was developed based on the students' identity ideas. They expressed a new sense of belonging upon completing the project.







On going painting




Invited by Espacio KB — a longstanding cultural hub located in Bogotá's Art District — to intervene their main gallery space, MUR engaged in 6 weeks of continuous painting that transformed the white cube into an all-over mural, covering walls and ceiling in layers of color and abstract forms over the course of six distinct sessions. Being the first of MUR's projects to take place in a gallery setting, this exhibition drove us to pull back the curtain and put our entire process on display. The result was an "open work" rich in potential and a bold demonstration of the inexhaustible nature of painting.
